# Hospital Radio Perth



Hospital Radio Perth began in the mid-80s when a group of enthusiasts got together in the hope of launching a service at Perth Royal Infirmary.

After several long months of fund-raising, the service first went on air on 20 February 1989 with the words, "Good evening PRI, you're tuned to Hospital Radio Perth".

Since then, they have gone from two programmes per week to broadcasting 24 hours a day - every day. They have moved to purpose designed studios in the grounds of Perth Royal Infirmary and have won numerous awards for service; but one thing stays the same. They remain just as patient-focused now as they did in those early days.

#### Mackenzie's Irish Adventure





We started off Monday morning for the early ferry from Cairnryan to Belfast which took two and a half hours. We all enjoyed breakfast on board the ferry, it was a lovely sunny day so we were able to walk about on the deck including the upper deck as it was a lovely calm crossing. Leaving Belfast, we drove across Northern Ireland to cross the border into County Donegal, a beautiful area in the North West of Ireland. We arrived in Burtonport, a small harbour village, to get the ferry across to Arranmore Island. We were very lucky and were the only passengers on the small ferry, a 20-minute journey and we arrived in Leabgarrow, it was a beautiful sunny evening as you can see in our photos.











Arranmore is a very popular island with lots of visitors, there is approximately 500 people living on the island who mostly speak Irish. There is one shop, three pubs, two small cafes, a day centre and a community centre with a post office. Many of the visitors from the island come from all over the world, several of these

visitors travel to Arranmore to trace distant relatives who once lived on the island. Many people left Ireland in 1845 due to the potato famine, they travelled to many parts of the world mainly America and Australia.

People continued to leave Ireland for work as many areas were very poor. There is a Beaver Island monument on the island of Arranmore to commemorate the islands joint history, Beaver Island is an island in Lake Michigan, USA, where many of the islanders settled and most can trace back a connection to Arranmore.

Over the past 10 years and particularly the past few years the Irish government have provided funds to regenerate the Island and Burtenport, the island still remains magical with its traditional ways of living. For over 50 years in the summer children aged 10 – 18 years old travel from the mainland to the island for 3 weeks at a time, staying with families on the island to learn about the culture and language. My cousin had 12 girls staying with her for three weeks at a time providing them with accommodation, 4 meals a day, they must speak Irish at all times, and they are only allowed their mobile phones for 15 minutes a day. They attend the island secondary school and take part in lots of different activities across the island, many of the children returning a second time.









Our B and B was a 2-minute walk from the ferry which looked over Leabgarrow Strand (the beach). We were very lucky with the weather dry, sunny and warm every day, Lily and Katie loved playing on the beach and at the play park while Ciaran and Lewis enjoyed daily games of football. We went to see the island lighthouse which has amazing views of the cliffs and steps which take you down to the water's edge where the fishermen would bring in their catch, it is no longer used by the fishermen but enjoyed by the many visitors who climb down the steep steps.

We enjoyed the sunny weather by spending a lot of time at the strand, the brave ones even swimming in the water. We went to visit friends and family and had lots of lovely meals in Earlys Bar, famous for its traditional Irish music nights.

On Friday afternoon we left Arranmore to spend a night in Dungloe, it is a small town well known for its annual international arts festival – Mary from Dungloe. Thousands of people come to Dungloe and the surrounding area for the festival, singer Daniel O'Donnell who is from the area will entertain as well as many other musicians and entertainers.

In the evening we had a lovely meal with my cousin and a walk in Dungloe.

On Saturday we travelled to Portrush, in Northern Ireland, stopping in Letterkenny for lunch with 2 more cousins.

Portrush is a busy seaside town close to the Giants Causeway. On Saturday evening we had our dinner in Portstewart, and we were lucky to spot some dolphins whilst walking along the promenade.

On Sunday we went to the Giants Causeway, which is a UNESCO world heritage site. We walked and climbed for 2 miles around the various sized columns which were fascinating to see, this is a very busy tourist attraction with visitors from all around the world.

Monday was going home day, on our way to Belfast we went to see Ballintoy Harbour made very famous as they filmed some of Game of Thrones there. At the harbour there is an amazing little café called Roark's Café which overlooks the sea, delicious cakes and ice cream. We sat outside and enjoyed an ice cream overlooking the sea.

Another short stop was at Ballymoney where there is a beautiful memorial garden to Joey Dunlop, a famous motor bike racing champion. The Dunlops are a famous motorbike racing family who are admired and loved by many, when Joey was sadly killed in a motorbike accident more than 50,000 people attended his funeral. Motorbike racing is very popular in Northern Ireland. The North West 200 road race is held between Portstewart, Coleraine and Portrush, over the event more than 150,000 visitors will come from all over the world to watch the racing.





A wonderful holiday had by all, many memories made, and photos taken. A magical country but we didn't see any Leprechauns, maybe next time.


## **VIEWLANDS HOUSE A HOME WITH A HISTORY**



The Abbeyfield Perth Society

Viewlands House

The house was built in the 1840's and was the home of the Rev Dr Robert Milne for 49 years. Dr Milne was the minister of West St John's Kirk in Perth. In 1840 Perth looked like this

The 20th century saw changes. There were several new owners but also improvementsThe walled garden included a wonderful orchard and there were raspberry and strawberry beds. The plum trees gave a wonderful crop of succulent fruit.

There was also a tennis court which now is the site of the Viewlands Court Bungalows which were built in 2003.

In 1950 The General Accident Insurance Company bought the house as a home for its General Manager, Mr Colin Little who lived there with his family till 1964.

In 1966 a three storey extension was built to make it a Training College for GA employees.

In 1983, the house was sold to the Abbeyfield Society for conversion to a home for the elderly with extra care facilities.

The home admitted its first residents in October 1986 and in 1988 Prince Charles, Patron of Abbeyfield, visited and unveiled a plaque to commemorate the occasion; this can be viewed in the front hall. At that time the home had 21 residents. There were some communal bedrooms which included a three bedded room which is now the lounge.

In 1997 a further extension was added to accommodate another 11 residents and all rooms were upgraded to include en-suite facilities.

Prince Charles made another visit in 2016 to commemorate the 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Viewlands House. At the time, we were the only Abbeyfield care home that the then Prince Charles had visited twice as Abbyefield Patron.

#### **The House As Architecture**

In 1977, the main house was included in the Statutory List of Buildings of Special Architectural and Historic Interest It is described as a "late classic styled villa".

Why shouldn't the plural of booth be called beeth?


If the singular is this and the plural is these,
